Fear No More; Trail Crew Attacks Poisonous Plants & Ticks

Poison Hemlock

Threat: Poison Hemlock was becoming common around wooded areas, especially around the edges of the woods, such as around Nature Trail entrances. It is extremely toxic if mammals ingest even a tiny amount of its oils. It can be fatal if pets chew on it.

Action: The Trail Crew has removed all Poison Hemlock on and around the Nature Trail and Arboretum. Some may come back next spring, hopefully in small numbers. It will be removed by the Trail Crew again then.

Poison Ivy

Threat: Poison Ivy is spread by birds around the edges of the woods and nature trail entrances. If touched, it can cause serious skin reactions which may require medical attention. If pets are allowed to run into the woods, they can get the toxic oil from the plant on their fur and spread it to anyone that touches them.

Action: The Trail Crew checks the trail and the edge of the woods and kills poison ivy plants. It is always safest to stay on the trail to avoid weeds & unmowed areas.

Ticks

Threat: Ticks are spread by mice and dear. Ticks climb to a high point on tall grass and weeds in hopes an animal or human will come close enough so they can drop onto them. Ticks sometimes spread diseases, some quite serious that need medical attention.

Action: The Trail Crew keeps wood chips on the trail and is widening the trail, creating a plant-free, tick-free safe trail. Stay safe by avoiding tall grass and weeds and keep your pets on the trail also. Always wash & check for ticks just in case.
