Sustainability Workshop Well Attended

On Nov. 18, 7 representatives from Lancaster Clean Water Partners, Lancaster Conservancy, Land Studies, and Landis Homes were greeted by a large group of residents interested in making WCV more bird, butterfly and pollinator friendly.

Birds and Butterflies have a common bond. They both need caterpillars. The birds need them to feed to their babies, and butterflies emerge from the chrysalis of certain caterpillars form each fall.

The present tact has been to plant pollinator gardens. They are good and they provide food, but provide very little shelter during the winter for caterpillars, chrysalises, and pollinators.

The goal is to allow the caterpillars & chrysalises to successfully overwinter. The strategy is to create no-mow areas where caterpillars and chrysalises can overwinter on dry plant material and in leaf letter in brushy areas. Growing grass and mowing it does not support wildlife. Sure, some grass is good, but some no-mow areas are essential to provide for wildlife.

Where can we have no-mow areas?

One area is the area around the Arboretum and near Swarr Run. No-mow areas are still mowed about once every 3-years on a rotating basis. Hence, 2/3 of each area is not mowed each year.

Another area is the bottom of the detention basins on campus where there is just grass growing and being mowed now. East Hempfield Township regulates how these areas are kept. Hopefully, we will get assistance from environmental groups and neighboring townships to let these regulations become environmentally friendly.

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WCV Arboretum is Full

On Nov.22, the six 2022 Honor & Memory Trees were planted. The plaques will be placed at a later date. This fills existing space. The Nature Trail & Arboretum committee received permission to expand the arboretum, but a way to access the new area needs to be worked out. Some kind of a bridge will need to be placed between the two areas so residents and the Trail Crew can go between the two areas. Until then no honor or memory trees applications will be accepted.



Trail Provides Arboretum Access

The Trail Crew is constructing a trail with a gentle slope to access the Nature Trail and Arboretum. You can access it from below Lew's Shed. It starts behind the bus garage and continues behind the bus garage and goes to the Nature Trail and Arboretum near the picnic table that is in the Arboretum. When this was being written it still needed wood chips and signage.
