Sustainability Workshop at Landis Homes



12 Woodcrest residents and management attended the Sustainability Workshop at Landis Homes. Part of the workshop was a tour of the amazing effort by Landis Homes and a resident committee to prevent water runoff and beautify the campus. They have plantings to attract pollinators. Where possible they tried to replace grass with plants that would benefit nature. Part of the workshop was revealing a model for a sustainability plan for Woodcrest Villa created by Land Studies as part of the Senior Living Sustainability Initiative. Dan Mortensen, WCV Vice President, created a committee of residents to work with him on the plan, outlining steps that can be done at Woodcrest and how they can be done.

Native Plants Container Workshop



2 Native Plants Container Workshops were filled to capacity. Everyone that signed up was able to attend and take home a container. The plants provided for sun (over 4 hours of sun) included Coreopsis verticillata (yellow), Butterfly weed (orange), and Goldenrod (yellow). Plants for shade (less that 2 hours of sun) included Celandine poppy (yellow), Phlox Blue Moon (blue),

Christmas Fern, and Downy Wood Mint (blue). They are all native plants and will attract butterflies and birds. They are outdoor plants and are to be left outdoors all year. Water about once each week. If anyone tires a taking care of their plants, Shirley Harms will take them and plant them in the Arboretum or on the Nature Trail. Shirley can be contacted at X 2505.

Woodcrest has formed a team to monitor water quality in Swarr Run and report the results to the Lancaster County Conservation District in conjunction with the PA DEP. The main tests are temperature, oxygen, salinity, pH, nitrogen and phosphorus. They also look for any signs of life in the water which are indicators of water quality.
