When I first moved here in 2015 & saw the incredible Lord's Prayer wall hanging that Lew made, I said "I have to meet this guy". Not only did I meet him but I joined the wood shop & he introduced me to scroll saw work. I then found out he was working on a nature trail, which at the time was just a short path behind the bus building. He wasn't getting any support for this & being a trail builder & maintainer on the Mason-Dixon trail & Appalachian trail I naturally wanted to pitch in & help.

As we were extending the trail there were a number of trees down that needed to be removed. Since chain saw work was routine for me, I took my chain saw up & we cleared the trail. Wow, did this cause an uproar! Somehow administration found out about this & we were called in on the carpet about it. "You can't cut down trees on the property!", & threatening to close down our efforts. We weren't cutting them down of course, just clearing what was in the way. Turns out it is a liability & insurance issue to have residents doing this kind of work. Fortunately they didn't close us down & today the trail is a half mile long, used by residents & staff alike, & our administration is highly supportive & helpful.

We even have an active resident driven trail & arboretum club, with more than 15 members, our own trail shed, tractor, mower, and all the equipment we need to maintain the trail (except chainsaws!). All this due to Lew's dedication & hard work.

Working with Lew has been a wonderful experience for me in so many ways. You couldn't slow this man down; he was relentless in finishing anything he started. His character was second to none, he was a friend to everyone, highly respected by everyone, & the depth of his faith was obvious. He didn't have to shout it out, he showed it in his daily interactions with people, & the works of his hands in his creations.

My life has been richly blessed for having known Lew & I will miss him.
